Leave Fireworks to the Experts

Did you know that a sparkler burns at 1,200 degrees Fahrenheit? In 2017, <u>over 12,000 people were injured</u> badly enough to require medical treatment after fireworks-related incidents, with over 1,000 resulting from small devices like firecrackers and sparklers. Not to mention that fireworks start an average of 18,500 fires each year. That is why it is recommended that you leave fireworks to the expects. However, if you choose to use them, be sure to follow these <u>safety tips</u>:

- Never allow young children to handle fireworks
- Older children should use them only under close adult supervision
- Never use fireworks while impaired by drugs or alcohol
- Wear protective eyewear
- · Never hold lighted fireworks in your hands
- Never light fireworks indoors
- Use them away from people, houses and flammable materials
- Never point or throw fireworks at someone else
- Only light one device at a time and maintain a safe distance
- Never ignite devices in a container
- Do not try to re-light or handle malfunctioning fireworks
- Soak spent and unused fireworks in water for a few hours before discarding
- Keep a bucket of water nearby
- Never use illegal fireworks

What is an Annual Physical and Why is it Important?

Many serious health problems don't have symptoms and are only found during a doctor's exam, which is why an annual physical is so important. When you establish with a Primary Care Provider (PCP), they know your medical history, can monitor chronic health conditions and manage your medications. Having a PCP is also important for when minor illnesses and injuries arise.

At your annual physical, your PCP will discuss your medical history, perform a physical exam and any necessary lab tests, discuss immunizations and age- and gender-appropriate screenings, as well as any health risk factors you may have and potential interventions. <u>Click here</u> to learn more about the basics of an annual physical and what to expect.

Your Franklin County Cooperative health plan covers one annual physical per calendar year. That means you don't have to wait a full 12 months between annual physicals.
